Now here is what two people, let's call them Smith and Jones, are saying about this potential legislation that would prohibit state public entities from contracting with companies that are perceived as not engaging with certain oil and gas companies, gun manufacturers or retailers, or other such employers.

Smith says woke businesses like some big banks are discriminating against gun manufacturers and retailers because they won't loan those type of businesses money due to politics, not because of any business or financial reasons. Smith says Arizona shouldn't do business with any company that is perceived as discriminating against gun manufacturers and retailers.

Jones says woke policies that encourage government intrusion into private business will end up costing local communities more money through higher interest rates, less competition, and fewer lending options. Jones says the legislation gives the government the power to punish private companies for their own internal policies, including how they manage risk and serve their clients and communities, and that the state legislature should focus on lowering taxes and improving access to critical infrastructure, not advancing political agendas.

METHODOLOGY

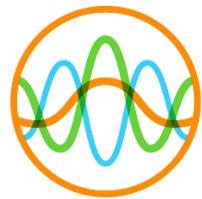
This probabilistic survey was conducted February 27 – 28, 2024, with 600 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of $\pm 3.96\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via live phones and SMS. This survey was weighted to a likely general election voter universe.
